# JAPAN EARTHQUAKE RELIEF

**COMPLETION REPORT** 

### WHAT WE HAVE BEEN UP TO

In mid-April 2016, two earthquakes with magnitudes of 6.5 and 7.3 struck the Kumamoto prefecture in Japan, followed by more than 4,100 aftershocks. As a result, houses and structures were damaged, displacing thousands of people.

In response, Mercy Relief set up community kitchens and provided healthcare services to survivors in evacuation centres. Now, one year later, we have completed our efforts to help reconstruct social welfare centres and provide healthcare programmes for survivors, particularly vulnerable communities; the elderly and persons with disabilities.

Thanks to your support, Mercy Relief was able to respond swiftly and has since been able to continue our work to restore the physical and psychological well-being of survivors in Japan while also increasing their disaster preparedness.

Together with our local partners, Mercy Relief set up community kitchens in 2 evacuation centres in Mashiki and Aso, which were among the worst-hit areas. This provided additional nutrition to daily meals and were well-received by the community. Evacuees from other centres in Mashiki also benefited from the general healthcare services provided such as health screenings, basic medical treatments and psychosocial activities.



### MR NOZAKI IWAO

Mr Nozaki Iwao and his wife, Mrs Nozaki Harumi, are residents at the Mashiki Techno Transitional Shelter, where they are waiting for permanent housing. The Nozakis helped with the food kitchen in the aftermath of the earthquake, even though their house had collapsed. The couple hope to be able to move back home with their children and grandchildren soon. However, they may not be able to afford the reconstruction of a new home large enough for the entire family to live in together. The road to recovery is long, but we are glad that the Nozakis retained their strong sense of family values and compassion to help others.

### MERCY RELIEF TEAM STORIES

Tingjun Zhang, Executive Director for Mercy Relief shares from her most recent trip to Japan, "We wanted to drive our focus on the psychological well-being of survivors, who were devastated by the earthquake. While infrastructure like shelter is critical, so too is establishing a sense of belonging for survivors in particular the elderly, who have been uprooted from their communities or families and are now living alone in transitional shelters."
